It's that time of year again, when we collect our thoughts and impressions about the past year and all that has been accomplished in our community. We are so thankful for this quiet, serene spot in northern Michigan, and for all of you who make it such a special place. When events in our nation and our world seem overwhelming, we look here—to our friends and neighbors—and we are filled with the confidence and assurance that goodwill and generosity do, in fact, abound.

We are always inspired and honored by your giving and by your sincere interest in making our little corner of the world a better place. Seeing you give and helping you share those gifts with our community is an incredible privilege and responsibility—one that we don't take lightly.

The past year was our biggest year ever for grantmaking. Thanks to your generosity, we reached two important milestones. Shirley Gibson is a fourth-generation Charlevoix native. She moved away for a time but grew tired of big city living and returned home in the eighties. Shirley always loved the scenic trails around the city, the rolling dunes near Mt. McSaubia, the tree-lined streets downtown, and the quiet serenity of her own backyard. She's been involved in city politics frequently through the years, serving her community in leadership roles. When it came time for her to think more about her own estate and the legacy she wants to leave, she decided to talk with the Community Foundation about ways to keep supporting Charlevoix even after she's gone. Shirley, like many other area residents, chose to leave a portion of her estate to the Community Foundation, where she knew it would be well-managed and would do good work for years to come.

Each year, area organizations that care for animals and the environment will receive a check from Shirley's fund, allowing them to continue to carry out and improve their important work. "I just knew it was a good thing to do," said Shirley. "You have to take care of things while you are here, but being able to help take care of them in the future is a real gift."

"It's very important to me to keep our environment clean and safe. The natural beauty here is what brings so many people to this area, and we must make sure that we keep it pristine so we can all continue to enjoy it," said Shirley.

Caring for
Others

When one person suffers, we all suffer. That approach may seem too broad for some, but here in Charlevoix County, we know it is true—poor health, illness, and pain not only affect individuals, but families and communities as well. With that in mind, we’ve made health and wellness a priority for our grantmaking for the past 24 years, supporting community health programs and hospital projects that make healthy living more accessible for more of our citizens.

When Munson Healthcare Charlevoix Hospital recently announced its plan to upgrade the current surgical wing, the Community Foundation responded with grants from multiple funds totaling more than \$65,000. The renovations are now underway, including needed equipment upgrades, updates to the surgical and laboratory services, and the addition of a third operating room. Patient pre-op and recovery rooms were also restructured to provide comfortable, quiet spaces to rest while looking out on Lake Michigan. For the people who utilize these spaces each year, the experience of receiving high-quality healthcare in a friendly and welcoming environment demonstrates one core strength of our community—coming together to care for those in need.

Empowering our Youth



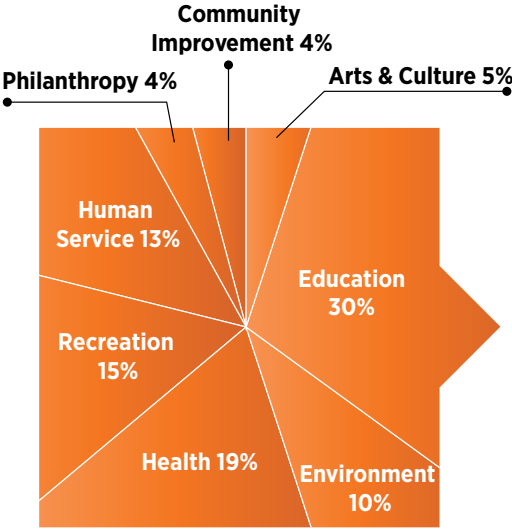

The Community Foundation supported anti-bullying programs and speakers to help bolster a unified atmosphere in local schools.

Since our inception, we've made youth a core concern by dedicating an entire fund just to meet youth needs. Our Youth Advisory Council (YAC) distributes thousands of dollars each year to causes that benefit local young people. Last year, the YAC brought in a nationally known anti-bullying speaker to all county middle and high schools, and this year, area superintendents wanted to see a similar program on all of their campuses again.

The superintendents collaborated to write and present their grant request to the YAC, whose recommendation to approve the grant was supported by the Foundation's Board of Trustees. In March, the grant brought speaker Tom Thelen to the area to visit all six local communities, urging students to be "victim-proof." Matt Stevenson, East Jordan Superintendent, said, "We want to give children the tools to understand the importance of being respectful to others, how to work through tough topics, and how to develop good communication skills." Giving back to our youth today helps them mature into thoughtful, responsible, and caring adults.

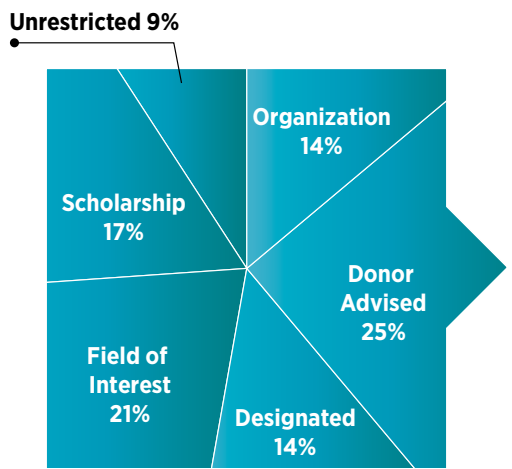
GRANTS BY PROGRAM AREA

as of 9.30.16



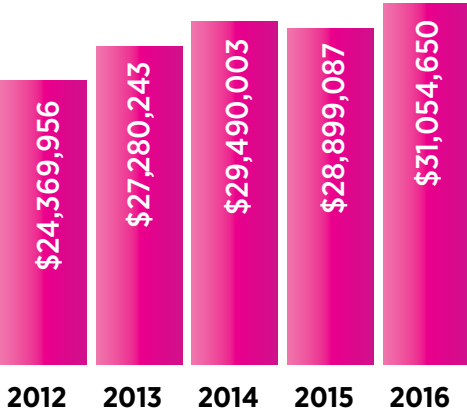
ASSETS BY FUND TYPE

Founded by a group of local citizens in 1992, the organization has grown to be a valuable resource for our county, distributing millions of dollars in grants over the past 24 years.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE moving *forward?*

MOVING FORWARD means we keep making things better. Moving forward is a way to stay connected, to keep improving. It is a way to make good situations better. Moving forward allows us to create positive change, to answer pressing questions, and to meet urgent needs. Moving forward is also a privilege—one that's made possible by the many people giving back. Moving forward is the result of hard work, commitment, and creativity. When our community is truly moving forward, it's because of people who envision the future we all desire, and then set about creating it.

The abundance of outdoor activities in northern Michigan is one of the things that makes living here so appealing—we can easily kayak, bike, hike, camp, ski, and more. For people with disabilities, those fun activities often require additional effort, equipment, and assistance. Since 1984, Challenge Mountain has come alongside families to provide recreational programs designed specifically for those with physical, mental, and emotional impairments. Utilizing adaptive equipment when necessary and working with trained volunteers, individuals with disabilities enjoy experiences they otherwise might have to forgo.

Elizabeth Looze, Executive Director of Challenge Mountain, said, “We are all about working together to make great things happen. From our volunteers on the ski slopes, to those working in our resale store, everyone works to build connection and community. We believe that everyone should have the experience to love life and leisure, and so we find ways to help all families enjoy the outdoors.” Each year, the organization provides recreational opportunities for over 1,200 youth and their families.

This year, the Challenge Mountain resale shop, which provides much of the support for the programming, was in need of a new building and signage. The organization also wanted to update its branding and promotional materials to further its organizational reach, and the Community Foundation distributed \$43,000 to help those projects happen. Communities that are truly moving forward consistently seek ways to build inclusive and adaptive programs for everyone to enjoy.

THE ADVENTURE OF MOVING FORWARD

Creating Inclusive Opportunities

We live in an area with incredible biodiversity, countless natural resources, all kinds of wildlife, and abundant beauty. Inspiring the next generation of naturalists is work worth doing. For years, the Community Foundation has supported Raven Hill Discovery Center, where kids can learn through hands-on science and history activities as well as get the chance to hold snakes, spiders, and lizards, and see turtles and fish up close.

This year the Community Foundation supported another event designed to inspire kids to appreciate and interact with nature. The Bio Blitz, hosted by the Little Traverse Conservancy (LTC) at Susan Creek Nature Preserve, involved students, scientists, LTC staff, individual volunteers, and families. In a joint effort, they observed and documented as many species as possible during a 24-hour period. While exploring the creek and woods at the preserve, the rotating group of volunteers discovered bugs, bees, frogs, and fish—together they identified 276 different species of insects and animals at the event. Previously this year, the Community Foundation also supported the construction of a new parking area at the preserve. The space is large enough now to accommodate more vehicles than before, including school buses. This ensures that individuals and families will have no problem finding parking year-round at this popular hiking spot along Hwy. 31.



THE NATURE OF MOVING FORWARD

Inspiring Kids to Care for our Environment

Raven Hill offers hands-on experiences in science, art, history, and technology both at their East Jordan location and through programs at area schools. Each program encourages curiosity and inspires children to connect with nature and their environment in fun and engaging ways.

As a Youth Advisory Council (YAC) member in the 1990s, Abbie Adams Hart learned firsthand the positive effects of grantmaking and philanthropy. She saw needs being met through the Community Foundation, and she felt a sense of pride knowing that she played a small part in helping projects and organizations get the funding they needed. Those experiences on YAC taught Abbie that even small contributions can make a big impact. “Even if we only gave \$500, someone else gave too, and then another person. With everyone’s contributions, the projects became successful,” said Abbie.

Abbie’s experience on YAC influenced her perspective, showing her that communities only move forward when people decide to actively give back. Since returning from college to live in Charlevoix, Abbie has been engaged in community organizations. Abbie believes being active in her town is what will keep it thriving. “If you don’t get younger people involved in their communities, then what is going to happen? We have to look to the future so that there is a constant source of leadership to keep our communities vibrant,” she said. Abbie is a Chamber Ambassador, a member of the Charlevoix Rotary Club, and a past participant and current board member of Leadership Charlevoix County. Abbie’s contributions of time and energy today are natural expressions of the lessons she learned as a teenager in YAC—demonstrating once again that investing into our youth has a long-lasting impact on Charlevoix County.

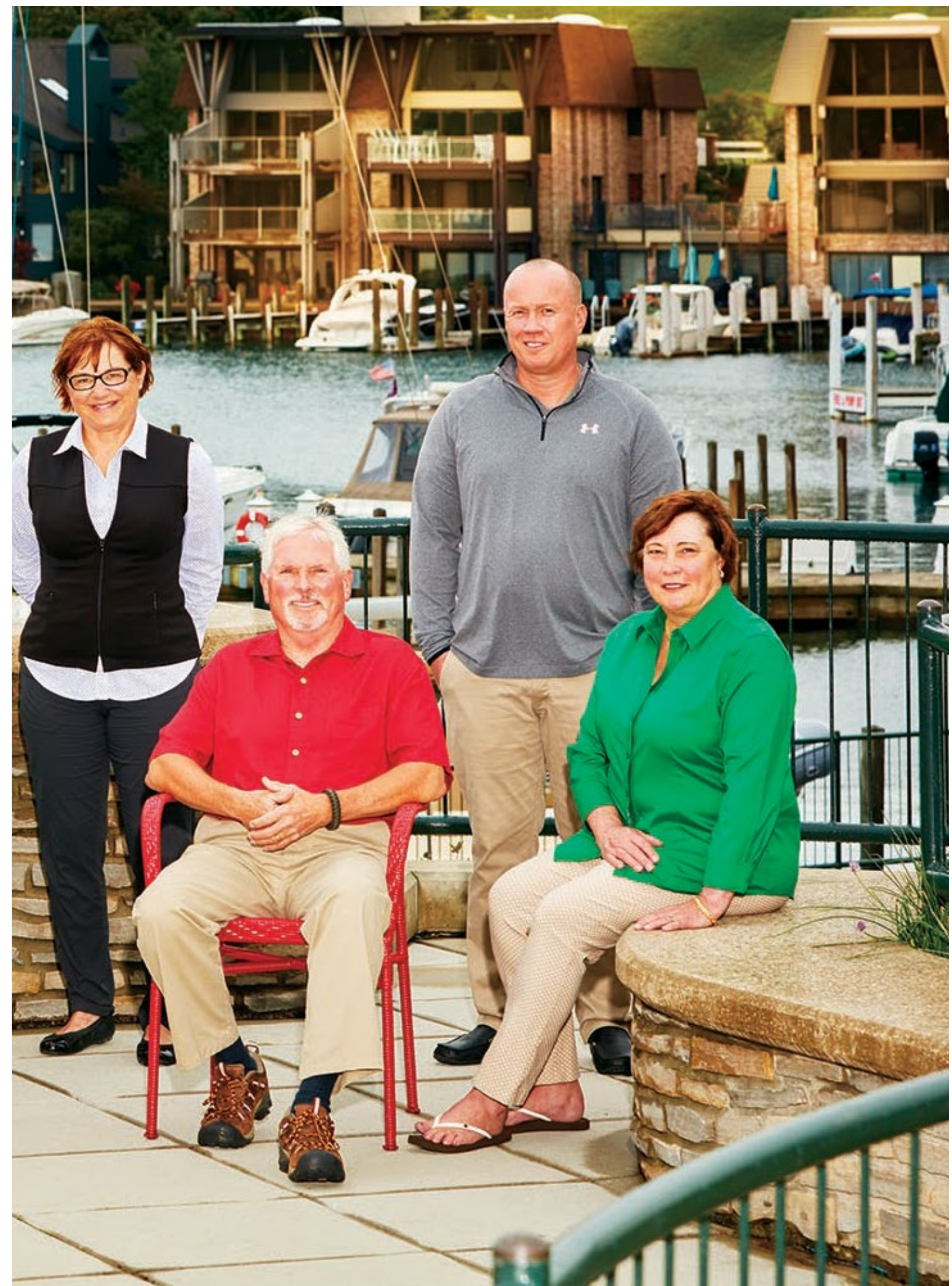
